## Fall Programs Feature Variety of Topics

Please join us at the Charleston Museum for our fall programs about a variety of topics — all entertaining and informative. Meetings begin with a reception at 6:30 pm followed by the program at 7 pm. Here's a description of our fall programs:

### September 10

Steve Bennett with the South Carolina Department of Natural Resources' Heritage Trust Program will talk about **Heritage Trust Program** and its current project on radio-telemetry of rattlesnakes.

### October 8

Dr. Phillip Dustan of the College of Charleston's Dept. of Biology will present a talk entitled "The Global Coral Reef Crisis" addressing his Florida Keys work and the more global issue of the diminishing coral populations around the world.

### November 12

Ken Bible with the Space and Naval Warfare Systems will present a program of "Birding with Radar." He will discuss his joint work with Clemson ornithologist Dr. Sid Gauthreaux using radar technology to monitor birds and their migratory habits.

## Message from the President by Bob Chinn

Welcome back for another year of CNHS programs, outings and conservation projects. However, there will be some changes from the last few years. As you may have already noticed, we will be publishing "The Lesser Squawk" only three times per year, in September, December and March. This is due to:

1. increased costs for printing and mailing .
2. reduction in member dues that National Audubon is sharing with the local chapters. Our share has been reduced by 80%! Consequently it is costing us more to service our 1,100 members than we receive from National Audubon. We will publish the newsletter on our internet site, and members

can keep up with news and other happenings between newsletters by logging onto our webpage.

Above all, try to recruit new members, because we receive a larger dues share from new members than from existing ones.

The reduction in the dues share from National will mean that we must make up the difference in order to continue our support of education and conservation programs in the Low-country. We will be conducting more fundraising events (bird-

a-thon, raffles, yard sales etc.) and trimming expenses wherever we can. For example, we must

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## Birdseed Sale: Major Fundraiser

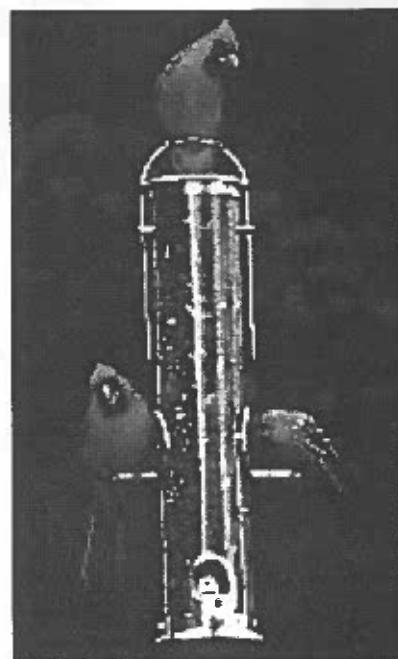
With the cutback in National Audubon dues share, the success of our birdseed sale is even more important than in past years.

# Field Trips for Fall Months

## September

### Charleston Birding

**Sunday, Sept. 15** — CNHS President and birder Bob Chinn will lead a half-day outing to **Pitt Street Causeway and Bridge, Mount Pleasant, and Fort Moultrie, Sullivan's Island**, to look for migratory shorebirds, egrets and herons, and other birds of the marshes, tidal flats and beach. Bring binoculars, telescopes, bird guides, water and snacks or lunches if you decide to stay later that day.

Meet Bob at **7:30 am** in the parking lot of the Shriner's Temple at Patriot's Point in Mount Pleasant.

### McAlhany Preserve

**Saturday, Sept. 28** — College of Charleston botanist Jean Everett and CNHS's Julian Harrison will lead an all-day field trip to CNHS's **McAlhany Nature Preserve** in Dorchester County to look for fall wildflowers, birds, amphibians and reptiles.

Meet Jean & Julian at **7:30 am** in the parking lot of Barnes & Noble in West Ashley (at the intersection of Sam Rittenberg Avenue and SC Hwy 61). They'll be in the section of the lot nearest the Hwy 61 entrance.

We'll stay in the field until early to mid-afternoon. Bring bird and wildflower guides, binoculars, mosquito repellent, water, and lunches or snacks. If time permits, we'll try dip-netting in the preserve's oxbow lake to look for various species of fishes, amphibians, reptiles, insects, and mollusks.

## October

### Grove Plantation

**Saturday, Oct. 19** — Brian Scholtens (College of Charleston biologist), an expert on butterflies and other insects, Jennifer Koches (Public Outreach Specialist with the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service), and CNHS's Julian Harrison will lead an all-day field trip to **Grove Plantation, headquarters of the ACE Basin National Wildlife Refuge**. There will be no hunting on the refuge that day so we'll have the area all to ourselves.

This is a repeat of our successful visit to CNHS's adopted refuge last year. We'll be looking for butterflies & other insects, wading birds, shorebirds, raptors, neotropical songbird migrants, and - if the drought has broken - various species of amphibians & reptiles.

Meet the leaders at **7:30 am** at the West Ashley WalMart parking lot on the Hwy 61 Expressway across from St. Francis Hospital. Bring water, lunch and/or snacks, binoculars, field guides (butterflies & birds), and insect repellent. We'll be walking and driving on the refuge. There are no admission fees.

### Laurel Hill Plantation

**Sunday, Oct. 27** — CNHS President and birder Bob Chinn will lead a half-day field trip to **Laurel Hill Plantation**. Meet Bob at **7:30 am** in the parking lot of Lowe's in Mount Pleasant, in the section nearest the IHOP restaurant.

Laurel Hill extends over several hundred acres with salt marsh, a freshwater pond, and mixed woods as the principal habitats. We'll have an opportunity to see wading birds, raptors, and migratory songbirds on easy trails throughout the property. Bring water, snacks, binoculars, field guides, and mosquito repellent.

## November

### Huntington Beach

**Saturday, Nov. 16** — Julian Harrison will lead what has become CNHS's traditional trip to **Huntington Beach State Park** in the fall. There will be a favorable low tide during the day, thus increasing our chances of seeing many kinds of shorebirds and waders, together with all or most of the other species one expects at what is touted to be the best birding area on the South Carolina coast.

We will be birding in or near freshwater and saltwater ponds, mudflats, marshes and tidal creeks, beach front, and an ocean jetty. Be prepared to walk (leisurely) about 1.5 miles to the jetty where rare or uncommon birds are frequently spotted. As the state park is about a 1.5 hour drive, meet Julian at Lowe's parking lot in Mt. Pleasant at **6:30 am**. He'll be in the corner of the lot nearest the IHOP restaurant. The weather could be windy and perhaps chilly so dress accordingly. Restrooms & other amenities will be available at the park. Bring lunches and/or snacks, water, binoculars & field guides. Entrance fees to the park: adults \$4.00, Children (6-12) \$2.00, Senior Citizens free (Bring ID).

### Folly Beach St. Park

**Sunday, Nov. 24** - Julian Harrison will lead an afternoon outing to **Folly Beach County Park** to look for shells, other marine organisms and birds. There will be an outgoing tide. Shell hunting is said to best in late fall and winter, particularly after a northeast storm, so if we're lucky one will have occurred just prior to our outing.
