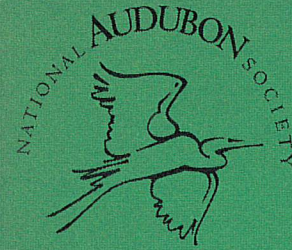

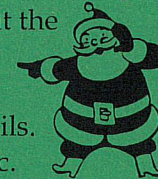

South Tibwin Plantation Jan. 13 Nebo Nature Trail In Afternoon

Our first field trip of the new year will be to **South Tibwin Plantation** and the recently completed Nebo Nature Trail at the Sewee Visitor and Environmental Education Center, Francis Marion National Forest, **Saturday, Jan. 13, 2001.**

Meet Leader Julian Harrison at 7 am. at the Lowe's parking lot in Mt. Pleasant, the area nearest the entrance from U.S. Hwy 17 North. Look for Julian waving an "Audubon Trip" sign! Bring binoculars, field guides, water, lunch and/or snacks. This is a half-day trip but after lunch at South Tibwin, those who are interested can accompany Julian to the Nebo Nature Trail at the Sewee Visitor Center.

South Tibwin is located about 12.5 miles north of the

Sewee Visitor Center and features bottomland hardwoods, pine uplands, tidal marshes, freshwater ponds, and waterfowl impoundments. There are five miles of primitive roads, and the area is open to hikers and mountain bikers only. The difficulty level is said to be easy. We will take our time and look for wintering waterfowl, hawks, eagles, and owls, as well as finches, sparrows, and other birds.

The Nebo Nature Trail is a one-mile loop behind the Sewee Visitor Center and includes a 2000 foot boardwalk, longleaf pine savannas, and the Nebo Ponds. It is an easy walk and features a variety of birds, turtles, alligators, and other critters.

Marrington Plantation Set for Jan. 20th

Julian and Bob Chinn will lead a trip to **Marrington Plantation** on **Saturday, Jan. 20.** Meet at the Super K-Mart on Rivers Ave. at 7:30 am or meet at the entrance to Marrington at 8 am. This is a half-day trip. Bring lunch, water, appropriate clothing and field guides.

Marrington Plantation is a Navy Outdoor Recreation

Area, a part of the Naval Weapons Station that includes wildlife impoundments (remnants of former rice culture in the area), pine and hardwood forests, wetlands, and boardwalks along a mile-long interpretive trail.

Tidelands Birding Festival, Feb. 22-25

South Carolina will be host to the Tidelands Birding Festival **Feb. 22-25, 2001**, at Huntington Beach State Park and nearby sites.

Check-in is Thursday, Feb. 22 from 4 to 7:30 pm. Guest speakers, Dr. Richard Phillips (duck behavior), Dr. Sidney Gauthreaux, (migration), Mr. Ian Thompson of Scotland's Aberlady Bird Sanctuary (shorebirds) will be presenting on Thursday, Friday and

Saturday evenings respectively.

Come join us for guided bird watching trips with expert leaders. Three types of trips are offered: advanced birding, casual birding and general wildlife. Also available are free workshops on using binoculars and bird guidebooks plus bird identification.

Tours include kayaking, plant walks and tracking a radio-collared

wild black bear. Enjoy exclusive festival-only trips into protected areas ordinarily not accessible to the general public, including Tom Yawkey Wildlife Center, Hobcaw Barony and Wailes Island. (Two guided trips per day Friday and Saturday and one on Sunday).

Advanced registration is required. Friday dinner is included with \$30 registration. Also included are a seven-day pass to Brookgreen Gardens, and entrance to the state parks.

Backyard Birder by Van Atkins

Fall is here and with it comes our winter birds that the Yankees have the rest of the year. The Bald Eagle is in full swing, adding to their nest to get ready to deposit their first eggs. I have seen several pair already in the local area.

In our backyard we have the white-throated and chipping sparrow, palm, pine and yellow-rumped warbler, as well as blue jay, cardinal, tufted titmouse, Carolina wren and white-breasted nuthatch.

All these birds keep me busy mixing up a peanut butter mixture for them consisting of peanut butter, cornmeal, lard or suet, raisins, chopped peanuts and you can add millet (or other bird seed). I mix it all up and store it in the freezer.
