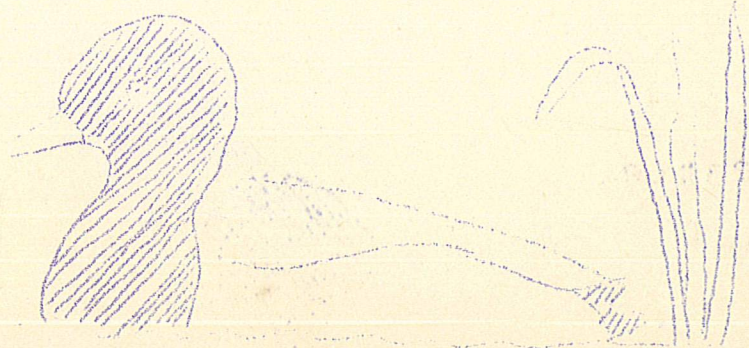

SPRING BIRD COUNT.

Our annual spring bird count took place in the regular census territory, east of the Cooper, on Saturday, April 26. Perfect weather, cool and sunny, but conflicting engagements reduced our teams and left the water and Bull's Island without workers, thus making our final tally less than it has sometimes been. Final count was 112 which was better than last spring when 7 members could only record 102. SWAN SONG.

This issue brings to a close five years of most pleasant and rewarding work by your editor, who will now turn the job over to someone else (to be appointed by the executive committee). I feel that five years is quite long enough for our official organ to reflect one point of view, and that it is high time for our younger members to have an opportunity to express themselves.

It may be of interest to our newcomers to list those who have had a hand (or pencil) in forming the lesser Squawk. It was started in 1954 (month uncertain) by Kay Comstock at that time treasurer of C. N. H. S. as an experiment and was an instant success. Unfortunately, shortly after its formation Mr. Comstock, who was with the U. S. Park Service was transferred to Chattanooga, but Kay had built so well that the then secretary, Betty Lemon could carry on for the rest of the year. At her resignation in 1955 (or '56) L. S. Metcalf, Sr. (at that time president) carried the burden with the able help of son Ted. In 1957 Robert Coleman took over and was editor until his death in Nov. 1962. Ted Beckett (president) and Edwin Blich in turn acted as editors until July 1963 when the present editor was appointed and has held the fort ever since.

At present who will be the new editor is uncertain, but may I remind you that an editor is supposed to select and edit contributions from the members and not write it all! Also remember that we are a Natural History Society and not a bird club and that items of interest on all phases of nature from our members are always welcome.

I am truly grateful for the many good observations that have been sent to the editor's desk and hope that you will continue sending them to the new editor. He (or she) will need your help.
